**“Heartfelt Worship”**  
**(Fifth in a Series on Being a “Healthy Missional Church”)**

Over the years, I’ve had the opportunity to worship in many different churches in many different places, not only here in America, but in other parts of the world as well. Some have been large churches, others small ones. Some have been in urban settings, others in rural areas or small towns. Some have been part of so-called “liturgical” traditions, others have been wildly contemporary, charismatic congregations. Some services have been extravagant “productions,” but many others have been relatively simple events. And while most of my worship experiences have been in Covenant Churches, others have not. In fact, the most moving worship experience I have ever been part of was at the Cathedral in Saint Paul.

I’ll be honest: some worship experiences have been more personally engaging than others. And yet, I think I can honestly say that—with a few notable exceptions (like the service where the “preacher” quoted the Qur’an as if it were equal to the Bible—Cheryl and I walked out of that one)—with a few notable exceptions, I don’t think I’ve ever been to a “bad” worship service.

The reason is that I seem to have an ability to worship in just about any style, provided two basic things are true: (i) the worship is focused on Jesus, and (ii) the people leading worship are there to actually lead *worship*, not perform for an “audience.” And even when the second of those is not entirely true, as long as the first is there, I’m usually pretty good.

One thing God has increasingly impressed on me is that worship is not about me. It’s not about what I like or don’t like. It’s not about how I feel or don’t feel. It’s not about getting my batteries charged or any of the other things that, humanly speaking, I could get focused on. Worship is about God, the gospel, and my *response* to both. And to be honest, some of the times I have been most uncomfortable in worship have been precisely the times that I have had the clearest sense of who God is and what his call on me might be (that’s probably *why* I was so uncomfortable). Therefore, the most important question to me is not about whether or not a worship service pleased me, but whether or not it pleased *God*.

A second thing that has helped me over the years is the notion that it is important for me to be willing to worship in a way that helps *others* worship. It strikes me that much of the trouble so many churches have experienced in terms of worship stem from one very basic issue: people demanding something from others, rather than offering something to them. The first produces division. The second creates unity. And there is nothing that should be more unifying than worship.

In a few weeks, we’ll be looking at this issue of worship in our sermon series on “Being a Healthy Missional Church.” Until then, let me encourage you to think about just two questions:

- When you come to worship, where’s your focus?
- When it comes to worship at Salem, is there something you can do to help others worship the same God you do?

2018: A new year, a new start.



A brochure from *Samaritan's Purse: Feeding Families in Crisis*. "Ongoing civil war has forced hundreds of thousands of South Sudanese to flee their homes and farms and find sanctuary in overcrowded refugee camps." More than 400,000 people are living in the refugee camp. They get rations of sorghum, lentils, cooking oil and salt, among other things. The people of Samaritan's Purse then share God's love, which gives them opportunities to attend to their spiritual needs as well. They offer Bible literacy and discipleship programs, crisis counseling, and church partnerships. Meanwhile, they also have sent emergency food supplies to places stricken by war, such as Iraq, and stricken by drought, such as Kenya. "As our staff provides physical nourishment, we share the Good News of Jesus Christ, who alone satisfies a person's deepest needs as the true *"bread of life."* (John 6:48) Please pray for them.

Matthew 4:4b says, *"Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God."*

A letter from *Hope Pregnancy Center* November 20, 2017: An unnamed woman and her husband had walked in to their clinic with their baby. She said, "If you hadn't been here, my baby wouldn't be here." Earlier in 2017, she came in to confirm her pregnancy. She was afraid and in tears. After the test came back positive, they arranged for her a free doctor's appointment and gave her some much needed supplies. "She had been estranged from her family for some time and had even told them she had had an abortion." She has since reconnected with her family, and now they help her and her family. Please pray for them.



A letter from *Mercy Ships* November 2017: Three children--Jacques, Elodie and Marie, all siblings--had been blind. "They once spent every moment bound together in darkness. Now they're free." The cataracts that blinded them had been removed. Their mother Amina said, "Their eyes are bright now." Jacques returned to school, and the sisters will soon join him (if they haven't already). The lame, disfigured, blind and outcast people will continue to come to the Mercy Ships, all hoping for the "miracle of surgery." Please pray for them.

A map from *40 Days For Life* has a series of blue dots and red dot. The blue dots indicate areas where abortion centers have closes, including one in Minnesota. The red dots indicate areas where abortion facilities are going to be targets for vigils, including four in Minnesota. I still have the map in case anybody wants to see it. Please pray for them.
